

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# FOREWORD

t is possible for even Christians to take for granted the presence and greatness of God. We are often beset by distractions, with our work and with the demands of life. Indeed, such are our preoccupations that it is possible to attend worship services, sing the songs, hear the sermons, and leave, still unmindful of the greatness and grace of God.

But Christ summons us to live a God-centered and God-focused life. This is not a burden that weighs us down and bends our backs. Quite the reverse. Nothing is so liberating as the knowledge of God. It liberates us from the incessant tyranny of our own selves, from the captivity to the follies that assault us in the workplace, in the movies, and on television, demanding that we fall into line if we are to be regarded as "normal." It liberates us to find the original purpose of our creation, to see beyond what is immediate, urgent, and pressing to what is actually important and enduring. It is this knowledge that gives to life depth, integrity, direction, and stability amidst all of the storms and catastrophes.

I, therefore, welcome Rosemary Jensen's book because it is a useful guide in helping us to think about God, to seek after him in prayer, and to nurture in our lives the spiritual priorities that should result because of who God is. It is in thinking about him in his greatness, in the full array of his attributes, that our minds are enlarged, our lives are reoriented, and our thirst for him is deepened.

The psalmist, who knew so much less than we know about God's disclosure of himself in Scripture, nevertheless likened

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the longing of his soul for God to that of the deer who "pants for flowing streams" (Ps. 42:1). May our thirsting for God be like that!

# INTRODUCTION

When we can anyone write a book about the very character of God? The truth is, I didn't start out to write a book at all. It just happened.

When, at age sixteen, I came to faith in Christ, God put into my heart the desire to teach others about him. At seventeen I knew I wanted to teach others in the foreign mission field. I didn't know enough about God, however, to teach anybody! But I did know that the Bible is the source of knowledge about God.

So I began a program of daily Bible reading that has persisted throughout my life.

That habit only heightened my desire to know God more fully. John 17:3 says that eternal life consists of knowing God and his Son Jesus Christ. So I set a goal to read through the entire Bible and write out the verses that exemplify or explain God's attributes. As the list of attributes grew, I decided to stop at thirty-one and focus on one attribute a day as I worshiped God for a month.

I spent more than three years reading and writing the verses. Going over the verses month after month, I learned much about God—knowledge that I could pass on to others. As Executive Director of Bible Study Fellowship (BSF), I shared these verses with the staff and leadership and was encouraged by their response.

But more importantly, my knowledge of God led me to praise and give thanks each day as, through the actual words of Scripture, I meditated on his specific attributes. As I concentrated on God himself, the Holy Spirit led my prayers of petition to be more

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God-centered. And I prayed that others would benefit from knowing God in these specific ways.

The format of *Praying the Attributes of God* is that of the acrostic ACTS (adoration, confession, thanksgiving, and supplication), and I believe its primary value lies in personal devotions. It would also be good to use as an annual prayer diary. This is not a how-to book. It is designed so that the words from Scripture sink into your mind and then into your heart. The Holy Spirit will then lead you into the action he wants you, as an individual, to take.

At present this material is being used by many BSF students throughout the world and in ten countries in Africa where the Rafiki Foundation has seminary students. This new edition is using the English Standard Version in order to accommodate the readers in Africa. It has also been translated into Spanish.

All proceeds from the sale of this book go to the Rafiki Foundation.<sup>1</sup>

I am grateful to my family and the staff of Rafiki and BSF for their encouragement. In particular, I thank Mary Ann Oatis, a BSF teaching leader who insisted that this book be published—and went to the trouble to see that it was.

The book is dedicated to my husband, Bob, who went home to be with the Lord on December 5, 2014. He encouraged me for sixty years to fulfill God's calling and provided me with his love and support in doing so.

My prayer for you, the reader, is that, as you use this book, you too will be filled with the love of God and the knowledge of his fullness.
