Story Synopsis: Andi is turning seventeen when *Courageous Love* opens. Nothing gives her greater joy than knowing she can pull her own weight on the ranch. She spends her free time learning to trick ride on Shasta under the watchful eye of Riley Prescott, the Circle C's wrangler. Andi's oldest brother, Justin, is married and has a toddler. While heading home to get ready for Chad's engagement party in town, Riley and Andi stumble on a mystery: Why has the fence surrounding Mitch's special breed of heifers been cut? And that's just the beginning of their woes. When evidence points to revenge-seeking escaped prisoners Justin prosecuted years ago for robbery and murder, none of the Carters feel safe. Andi must summon all her courage for the horrifying experiences that lie ahead for her, her sister-in-law Lucy, and her little nephew Sammy.

TRICK RIDING

From the first time she watched eight-year-old Riley stand up on his black horse, Midnight, Andi has wanted to learn to trick ride. Her desire was reinforced when she saw the cowhand Toledo do a somersault, fly off his horse, and land on his feet (with his hat still on his head). Every since then, Andi has itched to try a similar riding stunt for herself. But ranch boss Chad insists a working ranch is no place for such foolishness. Besides, he believes it's downright dangerous.

What is trick riding? It is the act of performing stunts on horseback. And is familiar with standing up on Shasta while galloping. She knows about the somersault trick. Riley also teaches And the pickup trick. There are many other kinds of riding stunts. Here are a few:



 \Rightarrow Using a strap, the rider hangs upside down off the side of a horse while galloping around the arena (death drag).

 \Rightarrow The rider runs and jumps onto a galloping horse, and then jumps off the horse.

 \Rightarrow While galloping, the rider crawls under the belly of his/ her horse and back into the saddle.

 \Rightarrow The rider hangs lengthwise along the side of a galloping horse (Apache hideaway). The native Americans used this trick to avoid being wounded during battle.

⇒ In Roman riding, the rider stands atop a pair of cantering horses with one foot on each horse. This stunt goes back to the time of the Roman Empire. Sometimes this stunt includes five horses with the rider standing atop the inner three horses.

Trick riding is relatively new to America. Earlier in history, Russian Cossacks rode like crazy, performing tricks on their horses to evade their enemies. Soon, Americans caught on to these eye -popping stunts. In the late 1800s, cowboys competed for prize money at rodeos and Wild West shows. However, trick-riding rodeo competitions came to an end in the 1940s. Why? Chad was right. Trick riding is dangerous. Performers were taking too many chances to earn the prize. Today, stunt riding is a specialty act and not a competition at rodeos, fairs, or other events.

Vaulting is another type of stunt riding that involves gymnastics on horseback. Unlike rodeo trick riding, vaulting is considered a competitive sport. It has a long history of being an equestrian circus act, but its origins really trace back two thousand years to the Roman games. Another possible origin is ancient Crete, where people performed acrobatic moves around wild bulls.

Beginning vaulters compete at a walk or a trot while experienced vaulters canter. They perform specific routines to music and must include a certain number of movements in their act.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA BERKELEY

In the fall of 1884, Mitch Carter enrolls in the University of California at Berkeley. Although he has ranched all his life, Mitch wants to expand his agricultural knowledge. The cow college (as Chad jokingly calls it) can teach him new ways to approach agriculture. In later chapters, Mitch's new knowledge helps his heifers.

In 1868, when Mitch was ten years old, a private California college merged with the Agriculture, Mining, and Mechanical Arts



UC Berkeley fifteen years after Mitch attended (1900), with the Golden Gate in the background (the bridge came later)

College in Oakland to become the University of California. Five years later in 1873, the university moved to its Berkeley campus. That first year 167 male students and twenty-two female students were enrolled. It was the first full-curriculum public university in the state of California.

Because the Agricultural, Mining, and Mechanical Arts College had previously taken advantage of a federal land-grant-to-colleges act, all male students were required to serve two hours a week (for four years) in a military capacity. They were trained in tactics, military drills, marksmanship, camp duty, and fortifications. (Mitch excels at marksmanship.) One of the campus halls, North Hall, housed an armory. In 1904, this requirement was reduced to two years of service. It eventually became the military's "Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) that many colleges offer today.

The age-old whine "It's not fair!" nearly bursts from Andi's lips when she finds out she can't go along with her brothers to check on the calves. She gives in, but not happily. WIND PUMP

Windmills have been around ever since people figured out how to harness the wind's energy for various purposes. A windmill can be used to grind grain, pump water, or create electricity.

The windmill on the Circle C ranch is actually called a wind pump. It is used exclusively for bringing up water from an underground well for livestock to drink. Daniel Hallady invented this type of wind pump in 1854, and its use quickly spread all across rural America.



HOW DOES A WIND PUMP WORK?

A wind pump and livestock tank

The top part of the wind pump turns freely so it can catch the wind no matter which direction it blows. On a breezy day, the vanes spin continuously. The blade apparatus connects to a set of gears that makes a rod go up and down. This long rod extends deep underground and is attached to a pump inside the well. Cylinders with pistons and one-way flaps allow the water to be pulled to the surface and discharged into a holding tank without falling back into the well.

ACID AND ALKALI

Andi's brothers drain the stock tank to flush out the alkali that has poisoned Mitch's heifers. To show how dangerous a high concentration of alkali in the water is to cattle, do this experiment. What happens when ACID (like inside a cow's stomach) combines with ALKALI (baking soda)?

<u>Supplies:</u> • 2 tablespoons baking soda • 1/2 cup water • 1/2 cup vinegar • large glass bowl

Mix the baking soda and water until it dissolves. Pour into a large glass bowl. Slowly add part of the vinegar to the soda water. What happens?

When the reaction stops, add more vinegar. What keeps happening?

What does this experiment show about what happens when a cow drinks water with a high concentration of alkali?

The reaction that occurs inside the cow's acidic stomach has devastating results. The gas bubbles created by the chemical reaction cause the cow to bloat and to belch. This can bring up the stomach contents, which burn the throat and can also seep into the cow's airway. If it is not caught early enough, death follows. Pouring grease down the cow's throat coats the lining of the throat and helps prevent the acid burns.

BARBED WIRE



Andi yanked at the wire with all her might to give Riley the slack he needed to overlap the two cut ends. Even through the leather protection, Andi felt the pinprick of barbs. She moved her hands slightly to avoid the sharp points. Scratched and bloody hands would be the crowning humiliation of her appearance tonight.

"Pinprick" is too gentle a word to describe being jabbed by barbed wire. It scratches worse than a

cat's claws—more like a cougar's (mountain lion)! Barbed wire comes in huge rolls that can weigh up to fifty pounds. If you lose control while handling this type of fencing, the wire will twang and snap and can wrap itself around your body. It can also dig deeply into your flesh. It pays to be careful when stringing barbed wire.





This is a close-up of a barb. A machine twists them into place at intervals along a length of wire fencing. This type of fencing is quite effective in keeping livestock enclosed. It is inexpensive and simple to put up. It only requires posts (wooden or metal), the barbed wire, and staples or wire

attachments. In the 1800s, many posts were cut from young pine trees of the proper diameter.

Before the Civil War, the West was wide open. Livestock moved freely, with all ranchers' cattle mingling. They were rounded up and separated a couple times a year. After the war, with more settlers moving west, ranchers needed to set boundaries. Other types of fencing were horribly expensive or not available (like the rock walls and hedges back East). Farmers in the Fresno area spent \$4,000 (\$75,000 in today's dollars) on lumber to erect wooden fences to protect 2,500 acres of wheat from free-ranging livestock. A cheaper method to keep cattle contained was needed.

In the 1860s, Joseph Glidden wanted to invent a durable wire fence with fixed barbs (smooth wire fences did not keep the cattle contained). He and a friend used a grindstone to twist two wires together to hold sharp barbs in place. The invention was a hit, and the first patent was issued in 1867. One fan wrote, "It takes no room, exhausts no soil, shades no vegetation, is proof against high winds, makes no snowdrifts, and is both durable and cheap."

That fan summed up barbed wire well. It is still the most popular wire fencing today. Cattle and other livestock respect it. Their thick hides prevent serious injury from brushing up against the barbs. It is not the best fencing for horses, however. They can be injured much more easily with barbed wire than cattle, sometimes becoming entangled in a broken fence (from thrashing against the pain). In that rare case, there is little that can be done to extract the horse until it has exhausted itself. Humans can also be seriously injured while working with barbed wire. However, proper clothing and slow, careful movements can prevent the sharp, stinging "bites" of barbed wire.

OLD WEST PRISONS

Justin does his research on the criminals he has helped put behind bars. He discovers that a few of them have escaped. Chad agrees that the West is full of "leaky prisons." What were jails and prisons like in the Old West? Some were good, some were bad, and some were just plain odd. Lawbreakers, regardless of age or the severity of their crimes, were arrested and put into prison with true, murderous convicts. Here is a sampling of some Old West prisons.



ARIZONA: It took the mining town of Wickenburg, Arizona, almost thirty years to build a jail for their town. From 1863 until 1890 they chained lawbreakers to a mesquite tree in the center of town called "The Jail Tree." There the outlaws waited under the hot desert sun until the Phoenix sheriff could come get them. No one ever escaped, but apparently the tree got so crowded one time that they chained an outlaw to a log. Tired of waiting around, he picked up the log and walked over to the saloon.

TEXAS: In the nineteenth century there was no such thing as making life pleasant for outlaws. Most prisoners were treated like animals. The worst of the prisons could be found in Texas. There men were chained up in iron collars. A fourteen-year-old boy wore handcuffs that cut into his wrists. Why was this boy in a Texas prison? He had simply been in the wrong place at the wrong time—the same place where a man had been killed. In many prisons there were a number of inmates who were not guilty. Many more had mental illnesses, which (as you can guess) got worse after spending time in an Old West prison. Is it any wonder that imprisoned outlaws claimed their innocence? Some really were innocent.

New Mexico: In Lincoln, New Mexico, the outlaw Billy the Kid and his pals were kept in a pit jail—a hole in the ground with a trapdoor beneath the jailer's house. Billy the Kid, however, escaped during one of his prison terms, only to be shot and killed four months later.

MONTANA: In 1874, the citizens of Helena, Montana, built a tall, elaborate, red-brick structure. It held six cells, an exercise hall, a kitchen, and a bunkhouse for the guards. However, there were no modern conveniences like electricity. It was a dismal place in spite of the fancy buildings.

Ірано: The Idaho Territorial Prison in 1870 included a work program. Inmates labored on a fiftyacre farm just outside the prison walls. They grew most of the food for the institution.

CALIFORNIA: The first prison in California opened in 1851 aboard a ship anchored in San Francisco Bay, the *Waban*. It was outfitted to hold thirty criminals. The next year San Quentin (from where Procopio and his cohorts escape) opened near San Francisco and could hold sixty-eight prisoners. It is the oldest prison in California, is still in operation today, and can hold over 4,000 inmates. It is one of the largest prisons in the United States and even has its own zip code for mail.

At the end of chapter 16, Tomaso Procopio Rodendo writes a note and signs his name with a flourish before nailing the paper to Justin's screen door frame. He has revenge in mind, and he feels justified. Where does the expression "an eye for an eye" come from, and what does it mean?

"An eye for an eye" is the law of retaliation or vengeance. It's the right of injured persons to pay back those who injured them in the same way they were injured (or had a crime committed against them). It goes back to ancient times. For example, in 1754 BC, the Code of Hammurabi included "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" as part of its law.

The Old Testament also mentions retaliation in many places. "If a man injures his neighbor, just as he has done, so it shall be done to him: fracture for fracture, eye for eye, tooth for tooth; just as he has injured a man, so it shall be inflicted on him." (Lev. 24:19–20 NASB). It's important to realize that the punishment could not go *beyond* what had been done to the victim. This kept the victim from taking the law into his own hands and exacting more payback than was allowed. It's also important to realize that the offender usually paid back the injured person with money to compensate for his loss (instead of blinding him or knocking out his tooth). If not, most of the nation of Israel would have ended up blind and toothless.

TOMASO PROCOPIO RODENDO



Procopio (also known as Red-handed Dick and Red Dick) was one of the best-known bandits in Californian history. He got his nickname either from his red hair (unlikely) or because of his violent nature and bloodthirstiness. In 1872, the *San Francisco Chronicle* called him "one of the most fearless and daring desperadoes . . . of our state." Some newspapers compared him to Robin Hood. Procopio was often aided in escaping from lawmen by Mexicans living in California.

Tomaso was born in Mexico around 1841. His father was a *vaquero* (cowboy), and his mother was the oldest sister of the most notorious

bandit in California history—Joaquin Murrieta. Young Tomaso and his parents came to the United States in 1853, the same year rangers killed Tomaso's uncle. The rangers kept Murrieta's head in a jar of brandy and displayed it around California for \$1 a peek. It is said that Procopio witnessed his uncle's death, idolized his uncle, and later grew into a fearless rider and a reckless youth.

Procopio's first involvement with crime occurred in 1862 when he was suspected of the murder of a southern California rancher. But there was not enough evidence to charge him with the crime. He fled north after that and soon became the leader of a bandit gang that engaged in nighttime raids on farms and ranches in the area. In



1863, the gang was suspected in the brutal murder of a rancher, his wife, and his two children. The house was burned to the ground. Procopio was freed again for lack of evidence.

He was finally caught stealing *a lot* of cattle from a rancher named Pope. Procopio took full blame, served nine years in San Quentin, and was released in 1871. Did he learn his lesson? Not according to the *Alameda Gazette*: Procopio "returned to his old practices as a dog to vomit." He teamed up with the bandit Tiburcio Vasquez and robbed the Visalia stagecoach. The passengers aboard the coach, four men and a woman, were tied up and robbed of two gold watches and \$500 in gold. An 1871 newspaper noted that Procopio and his gang were "splendidly mounted and equipped, wear good clothes and sport gold watches."

Following a few more stagecoach robberies, Procopio and Vasquez headed to Mexico to spend their new wealth. When they returned, Vasquez headed for the hills but Procopio stayed in San Francisco, where he was caught and arrested. The case drew attention all the way back east. *The New York Times* reported: "Tomas Rodundo, alias Procopio, who is charged with many murders and stage robberies, and other crimes, was captured today at his hiding place in San Francisco.

TOMASO PRECOPIO RODENDO—CONTINUED

He has been the terror of Southern California for years. He was surprised today, and had not time to draw his pistols, or, it is said, he would never have been taken alive."

But, as usual, the law could not find sufficient evidence to convict him of the murders. Instead of a life sentence for murder, Procopio was back at San Quentin for another seven years.

Procopio was out again in 1877 and returned to banditry, leading a gang in raids near Fresno, Grangeville, and Caliente. Procopio and his gang were captured near the Tejon Pass, and five members of his gang were lynched in Bakersfield in 1878. However, Procopio escaped, formed a new gang, and went back to his robbing ways. A slippery bandit indeed!

No one is sure what happened to the bandit after that. Some say he kept robbing. Others say he was arrested in Arizona in 1883. One account reports that Procopio shot and killed an actor in Mexico, was arrested, and was executed by a firing squad. Another account states that he returned to Mexico and served in the army. Some stories suggest that he died in the early 1890s. Who really knows? His life became a legend blown out of proportion. Men would pale when they heard his name, and mothers would use Procopio the Red-handed to scare their children into behaving.

And i likens her ordeal to that of a character from the book *The Pilgrim's Progress*:

"Just as [Christian and Pliable] had ended this talk, they drew near to a very miry slough [swamp] that was in the midst of the plain; and they being heedless, did both fall suddenly into the bog. The name of the slough was 'Despond' [Despair]. Here, therefore, they wallowed for a time, being grievously bedaubed with the dirt; and Christian, because of the burden that was on

his back, began to sink in the mire."

The Pilgrim's Progress is a free, public-domain book and well worth your time to read. John Bunyan wrote this famous book—which went on to become one of the most published books in the English language—while serving prison time for his crime: preaching the gospel without permission from the Church of England. John was arrested and warned, but he refused to back down, earning him twelve long years in jail. He was released in 1672. Six years later





his book was published.

The Pilgrim's Progress is an allegory (a story with a hidden meaning used to teach a lesson) about our spiritual journey from this sinful world (The City of Destruction) to heaven (The Celestial City). The main character, Christian, carries a burden (his knowledge of sin comes from reading The Book) from which he seeks deliverance. He leaves everything to find it. Christian has a number of adventures along the way, like falling into the slough, being trapped in a giant's Doubting Castle, and traveling alone through the terrifying Valley of the Shadow of Death. He meets friends along the way (as well as enemies who try to hinder his journey) and eventually arrives in The Celestial City.

John Bunyan was gifted with the ability to take spiritual truths from the Bible and write about them in a way ordinary people from all walks of life could understand. Besides the Bible, *The Pilgrim's Progress* is one of the best-loved and most-read books of all time.

Geography: Andi's Journey

The three-night and three-day journey to Procopio's hideout is a grueling trip for Andi, Lucy, and Samuel. Below is a map of the area through which they travel. Follow the instructions below to mark the journey and the landmarks on the map.

- 1. The bandits kidnap Andi, Lucy, and Sammy from Justin's home in Fresno. Fresno is the black dot in the middle of the valley. Label **Fresno**.
- 2. Label the **San Joaquin River** (north of Fresno).
- 3. Find the black starburst and label it **Bandits' Camp**.
- 4. The camp is close to but not actually along the North Fork of the King's River. Label the river **North Fork**.
- 5. The North Fork flows southwest into the main **King's River**. Label this river.
- 6. Label the small black dot on the King's River **Centerville**.
- 7. With a red pencil, start in Fresno and draw Andi's journey from Fresno to the river. Follow the San Joaquin until the river begins to twist and turn (this means it is flowing through the hills). Draw a line cross-country, but make sure it is not a straight line! They have to go around many hills and valleys. Cross Dinkey Creek and end Andi's journey at the bandits' camp.
- 8. In chapter 23, Ramón (Riley in disguise) presents sacks of money from the Bank of Centerville. Using a green pencil, trace Riley's route (and the route of the posse) from Centerville to the small triangle just outside the camp. This is where Lucy ends up, as well as the place where Riley eventually takes Andi.



POINT OF VIEW

A story's point of view is simply whoever is telling the story. The character telling the story in *Courageous Love* is Andi. She is the point-of-view character. The story unfolds through her senses (eyes, ears, etc.) and her thoughts. Since Andi can't know anything she can't see or hear, the reader cannot know it either. This is why the reader doesn't know what has happened to Riley the night they are kidnapped.

But it's fun to imagine what a scene or chapter might look like if the story was unfolding from another character's point of view. For instance, what if we could see the scene from Tucker's point of view back in chapter 16? On page 117, Tucker is lying under the porch swing. This is how the scene would read from the dog's point of view:

Right now Tucker lay poised, waiting for a signal. Ears pricked, he followed Andi's every movement. He wanted nothing more than to take a big chunk out of those strange men's legs. *Come on, Andi! Give me the signal. I can chew them up!*

To his dismay, Andi *did* give him a signal. The wrong signal. The "stay" signal. No matter how much Tucker wanted to disobey and go after those men, he did not. He laid his head on his paws and watched Andi, Lucy, and Sammy walk toward a buggy. As soon as they left, Tucker would find his master. Then he would go after Andi.

It's fun to imagine how other characters would make their way through a story scene. What about Riley? How does he find help later on or get hold of that bank gold? What is Lucy feeling while in the bandits' camp? Or how does little Samuel adjust to being snatched from his mother? It might be interesting to think about what is going through Jed Hatton's mind or even through Procopio the Red-handed's head. How does Justin react when he learns his wife, child, and sister are gone? Or when he finds the "eye for an eye" note? The possibilities are endless.
